ORDER to show cause why Decree of Distribution should be made.

On reading and filing the petition of Emma Woods, the executrix of the estate of J. X. Woods, and praying, among other things, for an order of distribution of the residue of said estate among the persons there to entitled:

It is ordered, that all persons interested in the estate of the said J. X. Francis Marion Zuck

Past Grand Master of Arizona.

From the Grand Lodge

Who departed this life on the evening of the 16th instant, and whose body was, on Friday the 18th, at the Town of Holbrook, Navajo County Arizona, laid at rest by his sorrowing brethren of Chalcedony Lodge No. 6, of which Lodge he was a charter member, and had served several terms as Master and was a charter member of Temple Chapter No. 8, located at Winslow, Navajo County, and was its first High Priest. He was a member of Ivanhoe Commandery No. 2, Knights Templar, stationed at Prescott, Yavapai county. In 1889 the Grand Lodge of Arizona elected Bro. Zuck Junior Grand Warden, and in 1902 Grand Master. In 1905 the Grand Chapter of Arizona elected him Grand Scribe and in 1907 Grand High Priest. At the time of his death he was Grand Representative of the M. W. Grand Lodge of Arkansas and Grand Representative of the M. E. Grand Chapter of Indiana Bro. Zuck came into Arizona on the first scheduled passenger train westward from Albuquerque, off the Santa Fe going at that time to Winslow, near the western limits of the the county of Navajo. He was born in Greensburg, Pa., July 21, 1838, and in 1850 accompanied his parents to Iowa, where he was reared in Marion county.

When twenty years of age he went to Wayne county, Indiana, where he was occupied in merchandizing for several years. At the beginning of the Civil War he responded to his country's call for patriots, enlisting in the 3rd Iowa Volunteer Infantry, with the Army of the Tennessee, he served under the leadership of General Grant, participating in the battles of Donelson and Shiloh, as well as many other engagements of that campaign. Previous to this, during the first nine months of his enlistment, he had served with his regiment in battling with the Bushwhackers in Northern Missouri. After experiencing many hardships and privations which greatly affected his health, he received an honorable discharge Nov. 20, 1863, and returned to Iowa. On coming to Arizona Bro. Zuck and his family made their home Carrizo for five months, and in the fall of 1882 went to Holbrook where he has since continually resided, being at the time of his death proprietor and manager of the Holbrook House. In politics he was a Republican, and has been one of the leading members of that party in Navajo county, and was well known among the prominent members throughout the territory. Bro. Zuck labored earnestly for the division of Navajo and Apache counties, and succeeded in getting the bill passed by the Legislature in 1895. Soon afterwards he was appointed Probate Judge, and in 1890 was elected Treasurer of his county. January 21, 1864, he married Miss Jennie Brobst, of Knoxville, Iowa, a daughter of Josiah, and grand-daughter of Judge Joseph Brobst. Bro. Zuck is survived by one son and two daughters. In honor of the memory of our departed Brother, it is hereby ordered that this notice shall be read in open Lodge at the first regular Meeting after its reception, that due record be made upon the books, and that the Altar and Jewels be draped in mourning thirty days thereafter.
